Review the Committees that Are Required by Contract

Staff Inservice Committee

Each site must have a staff elected Inservice Committee. Staff Inservice Committee shall advise and be consulted prior to all site inservice/staff development activities and the selection of all staff development days which are not specified in the Contract.

Site Safety Committee

The Principal of each site must convene the Site Safety Committee by **September 30**. Each Site Safety Committee shall include the principal or designee, Faculty Club Chairperson or designee, parent, and classified employee. Each Site Safety Committee shall submit its report annually to the District Comprehensive School Safety Committee **by November 1**. The District Committee shall review the report no later than February 1. The site can request an inspection which will be completed no later than March 30.

Consider Advancing on the Salary Schedule

October 1 is the deadline to file a request for a change in your salary schedule classification (move columns based on additional units). The paperwork must be received by the deadline to be implemented (retroactively: August 1 for those paid with 12 checks and September 1 for those paid with 11 checks). Coursework must be completed by October 1 in order to qualify for advancement. Don't wait for transcripts in order to apply for the change in classification. The request paperwork must be completed on time in order to comply with Contract language.

Law Gives Teachers the Final Word on Students' Grades

The California Education Code protects teachers' rights to grade students. When grades are given for any course of instruction taught in a school district, the grade given to each pupil shall be the grade determined by the teacher of the course and the determination of the pupils grade by the teacher, in the absence of clerical or me-

chanical mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetence, shall be final.

§ 49066: if a parent, student, or administrator challenges a grade the teacher has the right to defend the grade. An Association representative should always be present at such a challenge.



Teachers Are Responsible for Failure Notices

Classroom teachers are directly responsible for notifying parents of possible failing grades. Whenever it becomes evident to a teacher that a student is in danger of failing a course (D or F grade), the teacher must arrange a conference with the student's parent/guardian or send the parent/guardian a written report (failure notice). In all cases the notification must come prior to the assignment of the grade.

The teacher's responsibility for failure notices is stated in California Education Code 49067 and Montebello Unified School District Administrative Regulation 5121 (a).

TOPICS OF INTEREST THIS QUARTER

State Budget

Gov. Brown's 2015-16 revised budget is more favorable for public education. The May revision includes \$6B in new funding to the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) and a \$500M block grant for Adult Education. The California Teachers Association (CTA) encourages members to advocate the passing the revised budget to their lawmakers.

LCAP

The Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) public hearing was held during the MUSD board meeting June 4, 2015. Stakeholder input has shaped the District's LCAP. Compiled input was gathered from surveys, town hall discussions and committee meetings. The current LCAP document is available on the District's website.

Full Day Transitional Kindergarten/Kindergarten

MUSD has adopted the implantation of full day Transitional Kindergarten/ Kindergarten to address the needs of our community. The agreement with the Association and MUSD includes class size agreements, preparation time for teachers, grade specific teaching materials and facilities.

PE Clothing

A new state law beginning next year requires school districts to provide free PE clothes to students. The new law has a transitional period. During this transition period the law will be implemented to MUSD intermediate schools for 2015-16. High schools will participate the following year.

Information Technology

Smarter balance testing (SBAC) is on pace to serve nearly 15k students for this year. The District has created 11 new testing centers across the district to accommodate the SBAC. A teacher survey assessing the testing process is being drafted.

Elementary Report Card

Report Card Committee continues to meet with a goal of creating a teacher/parent friendly document that reflects California Common Core Standards. The committee includes two teachers from each grade level. An online version of the report card is expected for next year.

Bond Process

The District is investigating a possible bond process to help our facilities with needed improvements. Many of our school sites are over 30 years old with required infrastructure upgrades in technology, energy and space accommodations.
